The required renovation was performed in a very timely and cost effective manner as a CETA project under the administration of the VCPSEP. We are very pleased with our new facility. We have approximately 3 times more usable space than our former facility. The complete renovation resulted in a very attractive, functional facility.

PROGRAM SYNOPSIS, HIGHLIGHTS AND SERVICE STATISTICS

On May 27, 1980, the Illinois Department of Public Health's annual review was conducted at the Vermilion County Health Department to evaluate the health department's required programs and performance in accordance with the Program Standards for Local Health Departments in Illinois.

The Vermilion County Health Department was found to be in compliance with nine out of the ten programs required for local health departments. Once again we were judged deficient in the Food Sanitation program area. Consequently, we have once again been designated by the Illinois Department of Public Health as a Developmental agency.

The Illinois Department of Public Health Standards for local health departments identify ten "basic" public health programs as "required" programs for all local public health departments. The Vermilion County Health Department currently has official Illinois Department of Public Health approval for nine of the ten "required" basic public health programs and four of the five local programs identified as "core" programs for all local health departments. The Vermilion County Health Department does not have a Food Sanitation Program. Food Sanitation is designated as both a "core" and "basic" public health program required to be provided by all local public health departments.

Local health departments must provide the essential elements of the five "core" and ten "basic" public health programs before it can be designated as a "certified" local health department. Since the Vermilion County Health Department has Illinois Department of Public Health approval for nine of the ten required "basic" public health programs, it has been designated as a "developmental" local health department. The designation as a "developmental" agency indicates that we have three years to develop, implement, and maintain the essential elements of the five "core" and ten "basic" local public health programs, including food sanitation. Failure to meet the deadline established by the Illinois Department of Public Health will result in the loss of status as a recognized local health department and termination of state funds for all local public health programs.

The following paragraph, which is an excerpt from a letter written by William Kempiners, Director of the Illinois Department of Public Health, should thoroughly update and explain the consequences of our failure to comply with the Program Standards for Local Health Departments.

"In evaluating the 1980 program review, your status designation continues to be "developmental" with this status scheduled to terminate on June 30, 1981. The 1977 edition of the Program Standards is undergoing considerable revision; the revised edition will be

promulgated in January, 1981, with an effective date of July 1, 1981. These standards should alleviate many of the problems encountered in development and implementation, especially of those core programs in the Environmental Health areas. We have, therefore, decided to grant a one-year extension to your developmental status. This extension should enable your health department to develop and implement the above mentioned core programs by June 30, 1982."

Administration

The Administration Division is responsible for the overall operation and management of the Vermilion County Health Department and all of its programs and services. The responsibilities of the Administrative Division include budget preparation, fiscal management, grant applications, program priorities, policies and procedures, as well as supervising all personnel, program activities and record maintenance.

Home Health Services

The Vermilion County Health Department is certified by the Social Security Administration and licensed by the Illinois Department of Public Health as a Home Health Agency. The 1979 licensing process involved a complete review by the East Central Illinois Health Systems Agency before our Home Health Agency license could be renewed. The project review consisted of the completion of a project assessment document and a series of public meetings where we judge against the standard review criteria and the goals and objectives of the East Central Illinois Health Systems plan.

The Vermilion County Health Department was granted provisional approval as a Home Health Agency by the Regional Board of the East Central Illinois Health System Agency. The approval was granted on the provisions that the health department develop and implement contractual service agreements for Medical Social Worker services, and develop formal patient transfer agreements with hospitals and nursing homes in Vermilion County. The Vermilion County Health Dept. was in complete compliance with the provisional approved requirements on April 1, 1980.

Home Nursing Service

This program provides skilled nursing care in patient's homes throughout Vermilion County. The current fee for home nursing care is \$13 per visit. The fee is for nursing service based on an annual cost report and analysis. Patients who are eligible for Medicare (SSA) or Medicaid (IDPA) receive the home nursing services without

direct personal cost. All other persons are billed for the services they receive. Full or partial payment for services rendered for persons who are unable to pay for said services are covered by a grant from the Danville United Fund. The United Community Fund grant is administered and disbursed by the Child Welfare and Visiting Nurse Association Board.

Chronic Disease/Elderly Health Care

Our Elderly Health Care program currently consists of a part-time RN (1200 hours per year) who provides free multi-phase medical screening, information, and referral to persons over the age of 60 at 22 sites located throughout Vermilion County. Some of the sites are Senior Adult Meal Sites, while other sites are Village Senior Citizen Centers or Senior Citizen Housing Developments. The same nurse provides outreach services to assess the health needs of isolated elderly persons in Vermilion County and provide follow-up hypertension assessment in the patient's own home.

Also, we are actively working on the development and implementation of a Chronic Disease Clinic. The proposed Chronic Disease Clinic will provide free multi-phase disease screening and education regarding chronic disease to the citizens of Vermilion County, regardless of their age. The Chronic Disease Clinic should be ready to provide service by February of 1981.

Maternal Health and Family Planning

The primary objective of this program is to assure women of child-bearing age the optimum chance for wanted pregnancies and the successful outcome of pregnancies and adequate preparation for the motherhood role. Currently, medical examinations, pregnancy testing, contraceptive supplies and educational services are offered to all citizens on the basis of voluntary participation.

Our Family Planning services are primarily funded with Title XX supplemental funds and Medicaid (Title XIX) funds. Persons who are eligible, on the basis of income, for either Medicaid or Title XX funding, are not charged a fee for family planning services. Persons who are ineligible for either Medicaid or Title XX funds, are required to pay a fee which is determined by a sliding scale based on income and family size.

We currently have 5 regularly scheduled clinics per month. Clients are only accepted and scheduled by prior appointment.

Venereal Disease Control Clinic

The objective of the Vermilion County Health Department's VD Control program is to maintain an effective clinical program and achieve a reduction in the evidence of sexually transmitted diseases. The Vermilion County Health Department's VD Control program consists of a free, confidential, walk-in clinic held twice a week which provides medical screening, laboratory testing, medical treatment and follow-up for persons with venereal disease and their sexual contacts.

Women, Infants, and Children

Nutritional Supplement and Education Program:

The WIC program provides dairy-delivered, high protein, vitamin, and iron fortified supplemental foods for pregnant or lactating women, infants, and children up to the age of five years. Eligibility for the WIC program is determined by income to insure that a person meets specified medical and/or nutritional risk criteria. The current maximum case load is 1300 persons per month. Local policies currently require that all women, clients, and mothers of infant or child clients attend at least two nutritional education classes every six months.

Immunization Program

During the 1979-80 year, Vermilion County Health Department personnel initiated an active program to update the immunization records and immunization status of every school age child in Vermilion County, Illinois.

Our initial efforts were directed towards updating Measles and Rubella immunizations in response to several measles outbreaks in our general area. We also hoped that our efforts would enable us to locally meet the U.S. Public Health Services' national goal for the eradication of measles by December, 1980.

Another major objective was to completely update all individual student health records and establish a regular record maintenance procedure which would enable school officials to immediately identify the immunization status of each student in Vermilion County. This comprehensive record review was absolutely necessary because all of the schools had the responsibility of insuring that every student complied with the mandatory immunization requirements of the amended Illinois School Code. Any student who could not document complete compliance with the immunization requirements on or before October 15, 1980, found exclusion from school until he or she could document compliance.

The complete immunization which includes the above described special project, are listed below. I would like to emphasize that the program was very demanding and time consuming. It required approximately 400 hours of staff time for Vermilion County Health Dept. personnel to review and document the individual immunization status of approximately 7800 students. The other 10,000 student health records were checked by school nurses in various school districts.

Environmental Health Division

Environmental Health is a major component of public health. It includes the control of all factors in man's physical environment which may have a detrimental effect upon his physical development, health, and survival. It is concerned with disease prevention as well as the maintenance of an environment that is desirable for man's efficient performance, preservation of comfort and enjoyment for living.

The five environmental health programs required by the Illinois Department of Public Health's Standards for Local Health Departments are food sanitation, potable water supplies, private sewage disposal control, solid waste control, and nuisance control. All of these required programs are currently approved by the Illinois Department of Public Health except food sanitation. The Vermilion County Health Department does not have a food sanitation program.

Food Service Sanitation: Non-existent Unapproved.

Private Sewage Disposal Control

The objective of this program is to eliminate the transmission of disease organisms and nuisances resulting from improperly or inadequately treated sewage by providing that all sewage is discharged to a properly designed, constructed, and operated sewage disposal system. This objective is being achieved by enforcing the Vermilion County Private Sewage Disposal Ordinance and Code. The Vermilion County Private Sewage Disposal Ordinance was revised and approved by the Vermilion County Board on April 10, 1979.

Potable Water Supplies

The objective of this program is to eliminate disease transmission and chemical poisons or adulterants through the provision of a safe, potable and adequate supply of water for drinking, culinary, and sanitary purposes for every individual in Vermilion County, Illinois.

Vermilion County does not currently have a local ordinance to regulate private and semi-private water supplies. However, we do sample and inspect private water supply wells upon requests by residents of Vermilion County. We also collect samples from all semi-private wells annually to comply with local program standards set by the Illinois Department of Public Health for Private Water Supply Program.
