The Vermilion County Board of Health and the staff of the Vermilion County Health Department are very proud of the accomplishments during the 1981-1982 reporting year. We once again welcome the opportunity to summarize our activities, report on our fiscal status and report the types and numbers of public health services which we provide to promote and protect the public health of all of the Citizens of Vermilion County, Illinois.

We are especially proud of our official recognition and designation as a certified local health department. The Vermilion County Board of Health and the staff of the Vermilion County Health Department has been working hard to achieve this certification since July 1, 1966. Our achievement of certified status prior to July 1, 1982 was absolutely imperative to maintain our eligibility for the Basic Health Service grant funds, which are allocated by the Illinois Department of Public Health. The Vermilion County Health Department's Basic Health Grant provides approximately 20% of our total budget to supplement local funds and support the provision of vital public health services.

The accomplishments and public health services statistics detailed in this report were made possible by the dedicated work of our staff and the active support provided by many individual citizens, service volunteers, service organizations and other social service agencies.

Special thanks must be extended to the Vermilion County Board of Health and the Vermilion County Board for their policy guidance and fiscal support. Both boards have repeatedly demonstrated their concern and awareness of the value and impact of the public health services provided by the staff of the Vermilion County Health Department as well as their confidence and trust in the ability of our staff.

On behalf of the Board of Health, I am taking this opportunity to acknowledge our debt and express our gratitude to former Board of Health members, Steven D. Kelley and Donald Noone. Mr. Kelley and Mr. Noone both chose to resign during the last year. However, their contributions, over the last thirteen years, to the growth and development of the Vermilion County Health Department as a viable public health service agency for the Citizens of Vermilion County, Illinois has not been forgotten.

PROGRAM SYNOPSIS, HIGHLIGHTS AND SERVICE STATISTICS*

On February 16, 1982 the Illinois Department of Public Health conducted its Annual Program Review of the Vermilion County Health Department to evaluate our ten (10) required public health programs and performance in accordance with the Program Standards for Local Health Departments in Illinois.

The annual program review documented the Vermilion County Health Department's compliance with the Program Standards for all ten (10) required public health programs for the first time in the sixteen (16) year history of the Vermilion County Health Department.

Our only unapproved program over each of the last five (5) years has been the Food Sanitation Program.

During the last year we developed and implemented a food sanitation program in accordance with the Program Standards for Local Health Departments in Illinois. We were able to implement a Food Sanitation Program by signing a Retail Food Sanitation Program Agreement, effective November 1, 1981 with the Illinois Department of Public Health. The Retail Food Sanitation Agreement allowed us to initiate an approved program to provide regular periodic inspection of all retail food stores and food service establishments located in Vermilion County except within the corporate limits of the City of Danville.

Administration and Organizational Support-Required Program/Approved

The Administration Division is responsible and accountable for the overall operation and management of the Vermilion County Health Department and all of its programs and services. The responsibilities of the Administrative Division includes budget preparation, fiscal management, grant applications, program priorities, policies and procedures, as well as supervising all personnel, program activities and record maintenance.

*All service statistics reported are for a one (1) year period December 1, 1981 through November 30, 1982 unless otherwise noted.

Home Nursing Service

This program provides skilled nursing care in patients' homes throughout Vermilion County. The current fee for home nursing care is \$13.00 per visit. The fee is for nursing service based on an annual cost report and analysis. Patients who are eligible for Medicare (SSA) or Medicaid (IDPA) receive the home nursing services without direct personal cost. All other persons are billed for the services they receive. Full or partial payment for services rendered for persons who are unable to pay for said services are covered by a grant from the Danville United Way. The United Way grant is administered and disbursed by the Child Welfare and Visiting Nurse Association Board.

Hospice Care/Home Nursing

During the last year the Vermilion County Health Department has established and implemented a cooperative Hospice Care Program with St. Elizabeth Hospital and Lakeview Medical Center. The goals and functions of the Vermilion County Health Department Home Nursing staff is outlined below.

The goal for the Home Health Program of the Vermilion County Health Department is to provide part time, intermittent comprehensive service to meet the health needs of all age groups integrating the concept of family centered nursing to include direct skilled nursing care, emotional support, counseling and referrals to other agencies as needed for all family members. These same services are provided in hospice care along with added emphasis on pain control and bereavement since hospice promotes an affirmation of life and endorses

supportive and palliative care for persons in the final phase of incurable diseases.

The patient and family can expect management of pain and related symptoms, patient care instruction for family members, consultation, and emotional assistance for the family and bereavement support for survivors through the multidisciplinary team.

Chronic Disease/Elderly Health Care Chronic Disease-Required Program/Approved

Our Elderly Health Care Program currently consists of a part-time nurse (1000 hours per year) who provides free multi-phase medical screening, information and referral to persons over the age of 60 at 29 sites located throughout Vermilion County. Some of the sites are Senior Adult Meal Sites, while other sites are Village Senior Citizen Centers or Senior Citizen Housing Developments. The same nurse provides outreach services to assess the health needs of isolated elderly persons in Vermilion County and provide follow-up hypertension assessment in the patient's own home.

The Chronic Disease Clinic provides free multi-phase disease screening and education regarding chronic disease to the citizens of Vermilion County, regardless of their age. The Chronic Disease Clinic started providing services in February, 1981.

Jail Health Service Program-Optional Program/Approved by Illinois Department of Correction

At the request of the Public Safety Committee of the Vermilion County Board, the Vermilion County Health Department researched and planned the development of a Jail Nursing Program as a component of a complete medical service program during the months of March-May, 1982.

The Jail Health Service Program was planned and developed with the complete cooperation and assistance of the Vermilion County Sheriff's Department and Correctional staff of the Public Safety Building.

The Vermilion County Health Department actually started to deliver nursing services as a component of a well organized, scheduled and staffed Jail Health Service Program during June of 1982. The Jail Nursing Program is designed to provide basic health screening, physical assessment, medication administration and record maintenance services as required by the Illinois Department of Correction.

The Vermilion County Health Department provided scheduled nursing services including initial physical examinations, sick call, medication set-up and record maintenance at the Public Safety Building for 2 hours on Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week.

In addition to the nursing services listed above the Vermilion County Sheriff's Department has a contractual agreement with a local physician to provide supervisory, consultative and medical services to Public Safety Building inmates.

Maternal Health and Family Planning-Required Program/Approved

The primary objective of this program is to assure women of childbearing age the optimum chance for wanted pregnancies and the successful outcome of pregnancies and adequate preparation for the motherhood role. Currently, medical examinations, pregnancy testing, contraceptive supplies and educational services are offered to all citizens on the basis of voluntary participation.

Our Family Planning services are primarily funded with Title XX supplemental funds and Medicaid (Title XIX) Funds. Persons who are eligible, on the basis of income, for either Medicaid or Title XX funding are not charged a fee for family planning services. Persons who are ineligible for either Medicaid or Title XX funds, are required to pay a fee which is determined by a sliding scale based on income and family size.

We currently have 4 regularly scheduled clinics per month. Clients are only accepted and scheduled by prior appointment.

Venereal Disease Control Clinic-Required Program/Approved

The objective of the Vermilion County Health Department's VD Control program is to maintain an effective clinical program and achieve a reduction in the evidence of sexually transmitted disease. The Vermilion County Health Department's VD Control program consists of a free, confidential, walk-in clinic held twice a week which provides medical screening, laboratory testing, medical treatment and follow-up for persons with venereal disease and their sexual contacts.

Women, Infants and Children - Optional Program/Approved

Nutritional Supplement and Education Program:

The WIC program provides dairy-delivered, high protein, vitamin and iron fortified supplemental foods for pregnant or lactating women, infants and children up to the age of four years. Eligibility for the WIC program is determined by income to insure that a person meets a specified medical and/or nutritional risk criteria. The maximum case load for the past year has been 1300 person per month. Local policies currently require that all women clients and mothers of infant or child clients attend at least one nutritional education class every six months.

Our assigned maximum case load for next year has been reduced to 1100 per month.

Special Influenza Immunization Program September - October, 1981 and 1982

During 1981 and 1982, the Vermilion County Health Department received an Older Americans Act, Title II-B grant from the East Central Illinois Area Agency on Aging to purchase influenza vaccine for administration by local health service providers in the 16 county East Central Illinois region. The 1982 grant was provided funds to purchase 9000 doses of influenza vaccine.

The Vermilion County Health Department had to agree to purchase, distribute and account for the utilization of the vaccine for all 16 counties. Each health service provider had to account for the administrative cost because we had to document a 20% local in kind match (expenditures for personnel services, supplies, travel, copying costs and postage/UPS) to receive the grant.

Since the funding was provided by an Older Americans Grant, only persons over the age of 60 were eligible to receive the free of charge influenza immunizations.

Environmental Health Division

Environmental Health is a major component of public health. It includes the control of all factors in man's physical environment which may have a detrimental effect upon his physical development, health and survival. It is concerned with disease prevention as well as the maintenance of an environment that is desirable for man's efficient performance, preservation of comfort and enjoyment for living.

The five environmental health programs required by the Illinois Department of Public Health's Standards for Local Health Departments in Illinois are food sanitation, potable water supplies, private sewage disposal control, solid waste control and nuisance control. All of these required programs are currently approved by the Illinois Department of Public Health.

Food Sanitation - Required Program/Approved: February 16, 1982

The Vermilion County Board of Health signed a Retail Food Sanitation Program Agreement effective November 1, 1982 with the Illinois Department of Public Health. The Retail Food Sanitation Agreement enabled the Vermilion County Health Department to initiate the required regular, periodic inspection of all retail food stores, food service establishments and temporary food service establishments on January 28, 1982. The Vermilion County Health Department currently only inspects food service establishments outside the city of Danville.
