The Vermilion County Board of Health and the staff of the Vermilion County Health Department are very proud of the services we provided during the 1985-1986 report year. We again welcome this opportunity to summarize our activities, document our fiscal status and report the types and total numbers of public health services which we provided during the past year. We provide these vital services to promote and protect the public health of all the citizens of Vermilion County, Illinois.

The achievements and service statistics detailed in this report were made possible by the dedicated work of our staff and the active support provided by the many individual citizens, service volunteers, service organizations and other social service agencies. We are very grateful for the special \$3600.00 grant from Danville Area United Way which was utilized by the Junior Service Club to purchase 1200 doses of HIB vaccine for utilization in the Well Baby Clinics and our standing immunization clinics.

Special thanks must be extended to the Vermilion County Board for their legislative and fiscal support during 1986. During our 1986 fiscal year, we developed and implemented our local Infant Mortality Reduction Initiative/9 By '90 projects which required numerous budget amendments to develop and implement our Lead Agency administrative unit and the community network services. At the start of our 1986 fiscal year, we only had \$460,000 in projected grant income. At the start of our 1987 fiscal year, our projected grant income stood at \$980,000. The County Board's willingness to consider and approve these necessary budget amendments indicates their awareness and concern of the factors which contribute to our excessive infant mortality rate.

PROGRAM SYNOPSIS, HIGHLIGHTS AND SERVICE STATISTICS*

On March 4,1986, the Illinois Department of Public Health conducted its Program Review of the Vermilion County Health Department to evaluate our ten (10) required public health programs and performance in accordance with the <u>Program Standards for Local Health Departments in Illinois</u>. The next Illinois Department of Public Health program review is scheduled for February, 1988.

The 1986 program review documented the Vermilion County Health Department's compliance with the Program Standards for all ten (10) required public health programs for the third consecutive time in the eighteen (18) year history of the Vermilion County Health Department.

Administrative and Organizational Support - Required Program/Approved

The administrative division is responsible and accountable for the overall operation and management of the Vermilion County Health Department and all of its programs and services. The responsibilities of the administrative division includes budget preparation, fiscal management, grant applications, program priorities, policies and procedures, as well as supervising all personnel, program activities and record maintenance.

Vital Records

Effective June 1, 1983, Stephen Laker, Public Health Administrator of the Vermilion County Health Department, was, upon his request, officially appointed the Local Registrar for vital records by the Director of the Illinois Department of Public Health. Consequently, the Vermilion County Health Department assumed primary responsibility for registration of all births and deaths which occur in Vermilion County, Illinois. Prior to June 1, 1983, the Danville Commissioner of Health and Safety was the Local Registrar for vital records.

As the Local Registrar's office, the Vermilion County Health Department must oversee the activities of one subregistrar office and several deputy registrars. The Vermilion County Health Department is also authorized to provide certified copies of birth and death certificates which are recorded and filed at the Vermilion County Health Department. The subregistrar's office in Georgetown (Judy Sawyer, City Clerk) may also issue certified copies of death and/or birth records during the 24 hours they are in her possession.

The Vermilion County Health Department only has birth and death certificates which were recorded and filed after June 1, 1983. Certified copies for all birth and death certificates which were recorded prior to June 1, 1983, may only be obtained from the County Clerk's Office at the Vermilion County Courthouse Annex.

Home Health Services

The Home Health Service program provides skilled nursing care, home health aide and contractual physical therapy services to homebound persons in their residences throughout Vermilion County, Illinois. Effective June 1, 1984, a full charge fee schedule was initiated. The current maximum fees per visit is listed below:

Skilled Nursing: \$54.00/visit Home Health Aide: \$26.00/visit

The fee and/or charge per patient visit is determined by reviewing income information provided by the private pay patient on a required Fee Determination Form which is utilized to document whether or not they are indigent.

All third party payers such as Medicare, Medicaid, non-indigent persons, and private insurance companies are billed at the maximum rate per visit on the full charge schedule. The maximum rate per visit is based on the actual cost per home health service/visit as determined by our required Annual Medicare Cost Report.

Uncollected private patient fees and non-billed charges to persons documented to be indigent are charged to and offset by a \$31,000 grant from the Danville Area United Way. The United Way grant is administered and disbursed by the Child Welfare and Visiting Nurses Association Board. The V.N.A. Board also serves as the Professional Advisory Committee for the Vermilion County Health Department's Home Health Services/Agency.

Case Coordination Unit for the Title XX Community Care Services

During May of 1983, the Vermilion County Health Department was officially designated by the East Central Illinois Area Agency on Aging as the Case Coordination Unit for Community Care clients and service vendors in Vermilion County. The case coordination services are funded by supplemental funding awards and agreements with E.C.I.A.A.A., Illinois Department on Aging and the Illinois Department of Public Aid for services provided by the Vermilion County Health Department Case Coordination Unit service staff. The Vermilion County Health Department Case Coordination Unit service program was initiated on July 15, 1983.

The services provided by the Case Coordination Unit under supplemental funding agreements include initial assessments to determine client needs and eligibility, required or requested periodic reassessments and nursing home prescreenings.

Chronic Disease/Elderly Health Care - Required Program/Approved

Our Elderly Health Care program currently consists of a part-time nurse (800 hours per year) who provides free of charge, multi-phase medical screening, information and referral to persons over the age of 60 at 30 sites located throughout Vermilion County. Some of the sites are Senior Adult Meal Sites, while other sites are village senior citizen centers or senior citizen housing developments. The same nurse provides outreach services to assess the health needs of isolated elderly persons in Vermilion County and provide follow-up hypertension assessment in the patient's own home.

The Chronic Disease Clinic provides multi-phase disease screening and education regarding chronic disease free of charge to the citizens of Vermilion County regardless of their age. The Chronic Disease Clinic started providing services in February, 1981. The Chronic Disease Clinic is scheduled from 1-3 P.M. on the fourth Monday of every month. During May of 1984, we started a worksite chronic disease screening clinic at the Public Safety Building.

In 1986, the United States Post Office (Danville branch) requested the Vermilion County Health Department's assistance in the completion of yearly employee physicals. The employee must complete a physical and have their blood pressure checked by a registered nurse before being issued a new driver's license to operate the postal vehicles.

<u>Jail Health Service Program</u> - Optional Program/Approved by the Illinois Department of Correction

At the request of the Public Safety Committee of the Vermilion County Board, the Vermilion County Health Department researched and planned the development of a Jail Health Nursing program as a component of a complete medical service program during the months of March to May, 1982.

The Jail Health Services program was planned and developed with the complete cooperation and assistance of the Vermilion County Sheriff's Department and correctional staff of the Public Safety Building.

The Vermilion County Health Department actually started to deliver nursing services as a component of a well organized, scheduled and staffed Jail Health Services program during June of 1982. The Jail Health Services program is designed to provide basic health screening, physical assessment, medication administration and record maintenance services as required by the Illinois Department of Correction. The Jail Health Services program was approved and recognized as in compliance with the Illinois Department of Correction Standards for Local Correctional Facilities during their annual inspections in 1982, 1983, 1984, 1985 and 1986.

Initially, the Vermilion County Health Department provided scheduled nursing services including initial physical examinations, sick call, medication set-up and record maintenance at the Public Safety Building for two hours on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. However, during October of 1983, the Vermilion County Health Department increased the hours of skilled nursing services provided to the jail from two to four hours to meet the increased demand for services caused by the contract with the Illinois Department of Correction to incarcerated persons at the Vermilion County Jail.

In addition to the nursing services listed, the Vermilion County Sheriff's Department has a contractual agreement with a local physician to provide supervisory, consultative and medical services to Public Safety Building inmates.

Maternal Health and Family Planning - Required Program/Approved

The primary objective of this program is to assure women of childbearing age the optimum chance for wanted pregnancies and the successful outcome of pregnancies and adequate preparation for the motherhood role. Currently, medical examinations, pregnancy testing, contraceptive supplies and educational services are offered to all citizens on the basis of voluntary participation.

Our family planning services are subsidized by several combined grant sources including an Infant Mortality Reduction Initiative (9 By '90) grant to provide additional staff. Eligibility for subsidized services is determined on the basis of family income reported by family planning clients. The Vermilion County Health Department has a discounted fee schedule based on our costs for providing specific services and supplies. Clients are requested to pay a share of the costs of providing the services and/or supplies they receive for each visit. The grant funds subsidize these services by providing a fee-for-services reimbursement provision of services to eligible clients scaled on the individual or family relationship to the federal poverty guidelines.

The scope of our family planning services as well as the availability and accessibility of services was improved very significantly during 1986. These improvements were achieved by utilizing funding resources provided by the Illinois Infant Mortality Reduction Initiative to develop and staff an expansion of our family planning clinic services program to serve up to 3000 clients annually, to develop and implement a downtown satellite clinic facility, to hire a social worker and develop comprehensive family planning counseling services, and to employ an additional person to provide family planning education services.

Parents Too Soon/Family Planning

A new dimension was added to our Family Planning program in August of 1983. The Vermilion County Health Department received approval for a Parents Too Soon/Family Planning grant to provide the funds necessary to employ a full time Health Educator Associate.

The primary goal of the Parents Too Soon/Family Planning program is to prevent initial adolescent pregnancies with special emphasis placed on preventing another pregnancy to adolescent females who already have one or more children.

On July 1, 1986, our Parents Too Soon/Family Planning funding was increased to allow us to employ another Health Educator Associate. This added staff has enabled us to expand and intensify our community education activities throughout Vermilion County.

*During 1986, we reduced supply visits by increasing the amount of supplies we distribute at each supply visit for client convenience.

In addition to these service statistics, our health education staff is teaching most of the required family planning educational classes in both our Family Planning and Prenatal clinics, as well as providing individual counseling to adolescents as requested.

Outreach Counseling Project

In May of 1986, the Vermilion County Health Department utilized funds provided through the Infant Mortality Reduction Initiative (9 By '90) Community Network Services grant to employ a social worker to initiate this project. The social worker provides early intervention activities through outreach psycho-social counseling.

The priority target groups for the project are adolescents in Vermilion County schools, minority groups and high risk pregnant women outside of schools.

Prenatal Care Project

The Vermilion County Health Department was initially able to develop and implement a prenatal clinic as part of a Maternal and Child Health Improvement Project funded by combined federal Preventive Health Services and Maternal and Child Health block grant funds. The prenatal services were targeted towards pregnant, low income women and their infants up to one year of age.

The primary objectives of the prenatal clinic project are to improve pregnancy outcome, reduce infant mortality and improve parenting skills by offering a comprehensive range of prenatal, maternal, postpartum, pediatric, clinical and educational services with special emphasis placed on preparing pregnant adolescents for all aspects of motherhood through intensive educational activities and periodic postpartum follow-up assessment visits to their own homes.

During 1986, we utilized funds provided through our Infant Mortality Reduction Initiative/9 By '90 Community Network Services grant to expand services in this clinical service area. The 9 By '90 grant provided funds to pay for additional laboratory services and additional obstetrical deliveries. We were also able to implement classes for the Creasy method of preterm labor determination.

Infant Mortality Reduction Initiative/9 By '90 Project

The Infant Mortality Reduction Initiative is a program designed to achieve a goal of 9.0 deaths for every 1,000 live births in Illinois by the year 1990. The program is commonly referred to as "9 By '90". This objective is the same as the United States Surgeon General's objective. The target population is pregnant women and their infants to one year of age. The Vermilion County Health Department is the Lead Agency. The Lead Agency is to develop and emphasize networking, coordination and case management that will develop a comprehensive approach to the delivery of services to the high risk population in the Vermilion County area.

The "9 By '90" network for Vermilion County includes the following agencies:

Catholic Social Services: Counseling, maternity home placement, support and education for women of all ages.

Center for Children's Services: Work with women 20 years of age and under. Provide support groups, prenatal education, infant care education and counseling.

Crosspoint Human Services: This agency was formally Vermilion Mental Health and Development Center. Provide counseling, support, transportation for women 20 years of age and older.

East Central Illinois Community Action Program: Provide transportation for "9 By '90" clients to W.I.C., doctor appointments, I.D.P.A., Well Baby Clinic, etc..

Hoopeston Multi-Agency: This agency is for outreach and transporting of clients in the northern area of Vermilion County for I.M.R.I. services.

Laura Lee Fellowship House: A prevention program for teens called PACT (Peer Advocacy Counseling by Teens). Five neighborhood areas emphasize prevention and sex education.

Planned Parenthood of Champaign/Hoopeston Site: Provide family planning services to residents of northern Vermilion County.

Vermilion County Health Department:

Satellite Clinic: A clinic was opened in the Danville Township Building, 101 W. North, Danville, IL for easier access for W.I.C., Family Planning and Prenatal clinics.

Family Planning: Funds were provided to enable an additional 1,000 new clients to be served.

Prenatal: Funds were provided to pay for more obstetrical deliveries.

Social Worker: A social worker was hired to provide these services to clients and work with pregnant teenagers.

February 1, 1986 was the start-up date for the "9 By '90" program. Clients were seen beginning March 1, 1986.

Women, Infants and Children (W.I.C.) - Optional Program/Approved

The W.I.C. program provides high nutrient supplemental foods for pregnant and lactating women, infants and children up to the age of five years. Eligibility for the W.I.C. program is first determined by income and then must be at medical or nutritional risk as outlined by the program risk criteria. The maximum caseload was 2000 clients per month until February 1, 1986. The assigned caseload was increased to and remains at 2400 clients per month to accomodate the Infant Mortality Reduction Initiative program. Program policies currently require that all women clients and mothers of infants or child clients attend at least one nutritional education class every six months in addition to the individual counseling received at the time of certification.

Special Influenza Immunization Program (September - October Each Year)

The Vermilion County Health Department continues to receive an Older Americans Act, Title III-B grant from the East Central Illinois Area Agency on Aging to purchase influenza vaccine for administration by local health service providers in the 16 county East Central Illinois region.

*Haemiphilus Influenza Type b Vaccine (HIB). In August of 1986, the Vermilion County Health Department added HIB vaccine to the list of vaccinations available at the Well Baby Clinics staffed by our employees and at out own immunization clinics. This vaccine was made available by a special grant of \$3600.00 from the Danville Area United Way Board of Directors to the Junior Service Club.

The Vermilion County Health Department agrees to purchase, distribute and account for the utilization of the vaccine for all 16 counties. Each health service provider had to account for the administrative cost because we had to document a 15% local inkind match (expenditures for personnel services, supplies, travel, copying costs and postage/UPS) to receive the grant.

Environmental Health Division

Environmental health is one of the major components of public health. The Environmental Health program deal with all of the factors in man's physical environment which may have a detrimental effect upon him. The primary goals of the Vermilion County Health Department's Environmental Health programs are to protect and improve the quality of life for the residents of Vermilion County.

The Illinois Department of Public Health <u>Standards of Local Health Departments in Illinois</u> require five basic environmental health programs. These programs are:

- 1. Food Sanitation
- 2. Potable Water Supplies
- 3. Private Sewage Disposal
- 4. Solid Waste
- 5. Nuisance Control

The Vermilion County Health Department provides approved programs in all five program areas. The Environmental Health Division provides two other recommended programs: Vector Prevention/Pest Control and Housing.

Food Sanitation - Required Program/Approved

The primary objective of the Food Sanitation program is the protection of the consumer by assuring that food and food products provided by food service establishments and retail food stores are protected against contamination by infectious agents or adulteration by toxic material.

The Vermilion County Health Department's Ordinance Governing Food Service Sanitation requires the Environmental Health staff to issue permits to operate and carry out inspections of food service establishments, retail food stores and temporary food service establishments. This ordinance covers all areas of Vermilion County except the area within the corporate limits of the City of Danville.

A county ordinance was approved during 1986 which established a fee schedule for four (4) different classes of permits for food service establishments.

Potable Water Supplies - Required Program/Approved

The object of this program is to eliminate disease transmission and chemical poisons or adulterants through the provision of a safe, potable and adequate supply of water for drinking, culinary and sanitary purposes for every individual in Vermilion County.

The Vermilion County Health Department does not have a local ordinance to regulate private water supplies. The Environmental Health staff does collect samples and inspect private water supplies on request of Vermilion County residents. The water samples are sent to the Illinois Department of Public Public Health laboratory in Springfield, Illinois for analysis. The sanitarian interprets the analysis of the water sample supplies by the laboratory and reports the condition of the water in the sample to the owner of the water supply. If the water in the sample is found to be unacceptable for human consumption, the sanitarian will recommend appropriate corrective action. Of all the private water supply samples collected in Vermilion County in 1986, 36% were found to be unacceptable for human consumption.

Private Sewage Disposal - Required Program/Approved

The objective of this program is to prevent the transmission of disease organisms from improperly or inadequately treated sewage by providing that all sewage is discharged to a properly designed, constructed and operated sewage disposal system. This objective is being achieved by enforcing the Vermilion County Health Department's Ordinance Governing Private Sewage Disposal. The ordinance authorizes the Environmental Health staff to order corrections on inadequately treated sewage discharges, design and size private sewage disposal systems, inspect the systems prior to being backfilled to insure that they are constructed properly and issue licenses to all private sewage disposal contractors and septic tank pumpers.

A revised sewage ordinance was approved by the County Board during 1986. The revisions were necessary to reflect changes that were made in the Illinois Department of Public Health's Private Sewage Disposal Licensing Act and Code Book, 1986.

Housing Program - Recommended Program

The goal of this program is to eliminate safety hazards and transmission of disease through the control of abandoned and structurely damaged buildings. The Vermilion County Health Department does not have a housing ordinance at this time, but the Environmental Health staff enforces sections of the Vermilion County Ordinance Governing Solid Waste Disposal that deals with fire damaged or abandoned structures. The Environmental Health staff also conducts home loan inspections on request from mortgage companies, state and federal agencies, realtors and individuals buying or selling a home. The loan inspections are conducted on properties that are in the process of changing ownership and consists of an inspection of the water supply and sewage disposal system that services the property. The sanitarian conducting the inspection determines if the water supply is safe and if the sewage disposal system is adequate and functioning properly.
