PROGRAM SYNOPSIS, HIGHLIGHTS AND SERVICE STATISTICS*

On February 22, 1990 the Illinois Department of Public Health conducted its most recent program review of the Vermilion County Health Department to evaluate our ten (10) required public health programs in accordance with the <u>Program Standards for Local Health Departments in Illinois</u>. The next Illinois Department of Public Health program review is scheduled during February of 1992.

The 1990 program review documented the Vermilion County Health Department's compliance with the program standards for all ten (10) required public health programs for the fifth consecutive time in the twenty-three year history of the Vermilion County Health Department.

Administrative and Organizational Support - Required Program/Approved

The administrative division is responsible and accountable for the overall operation and management of the Vermilion County Health Department and all of its programs and services. The responsibilities of the administrative division includes budget preparation, fiscal management, grant applications, program priorities, policies and procedures as well as supervising all personnel, program activities and record maintenance.

<u>Vital Records</u>

As the Local Registrar, the Vermilion County Health Department must oversee the activities of several deputy registrars. The Vermilion County Health Department is also authorized to provide certified copies of birth and death certificates which are recorded and filed at the Vermilion County Health Department.

The Vermilion County Health Department only has birth and death certificates which were recorded and filed after June 1. 1983. Certified copies for all birth and death certificates which were recorded prior to June 1. 1983 may be obtained only from the County Clerk's office at the Vermilion County Courthouse Annex.

Home Health Services

The home health service program provides skilled nursing care and home health aide services to homebound patients in their residences throughout Vermilion County, Illinois. Effective June 1, 1984 a full charge fee schedule was initiated. The current maximum fee per visit was established:

Skilled Nursing \$58.00/visit Home Health Aide: \$29.00/visit

The fee and/or charge per patient visit is determined by reviewing income information provided by the private pay patient on a required fee determination form which is utilized to document whether or not they are indigent.

All third party payers such as Medicare, Medicaid, non-indigent persons and private insurance companies are billed at the maximum rate per visit on the full charge schedule. The maximum rate per visit is based on the actual cost per home health service/visit as determined by our required annual Medicare Cost Report.

Uncollected private pay patient fees and non-billed charges to persons documented to be indigent are charged to and offset by a \$28,000 grant from the Danville Area United Way.

Case Coordination Unit for the Title XX Community Care Services

During May of 1983, the Vermilion County Health Department was officially designated by the East Central Illinois Area on Aging as the Case Coordination Unit for Community Care clients and service vendors in Vermilion County. The service program was initiated on July 15, 1983. The case coordination services are funded by supplemental funding awards and agreements with the ECIAAA, the Illinois Department on Aging, and the Illinois Department of Public Aid for services provided by the Vermilion County Health Department Case Coordination Unit service staff.

The services provided by the Case Coordination Unit under supplemental funding agreements include initial assessments to determine client needs and eligibility, required or requested periodic reassessments and nursing home prescreenings.

Chronic Disease/Elderly Health Care - Required Program/Approved

Our Elderly Health Care program currently consists of a part-time nurse (800 hours per year) who provides, free of charge, multiphase medical screening, information and referral to persons over the age of 60 at 30 sites located throughout Vermilion County. Some of the sites are Senior Adult Meal Sites, while other sites are village senior citizen centers for senior citizen's housing developments. The same nurse provides outreach services to assess the health needs of isolated elderly persons in Vermilion County and provide follow-up hypertension assessment in the patient's own home.

The chronic disease clinic provides multi-phase disease screening and education regarding chronic disease (free of charge to the citizens of Vermilion County regardless of their age). The chronic disease clinic started providing services in February, 1981 and is scheduled from 1-3 p.m. on the fourth Monday of every month. During May of 1984 we started a work site screening clinic at the Public Safety Building.

In 1986 the United States Post Office (Danville branch) requested the Vermilion County Health Department's assistance in the completion of yearly employee physicals. The employees must complete a physical and have their blood pressure checked by a registered nurse before being issued a new driver's license to operate the postal vehicles.

In 1989 we received \$2500 from the Child Welfare and Visiting Nurse Association Board to help us purchase a \$4500 Reflotron (a portable laboratory testing machine) to screen cholesterol levels with a requested donation of \$5.00 per test. A total of \$2,675.00 was collected in donations during 1989.

Approximately 33% of all persons screened for cholesterol were referred to their own private physician for follow-up testing because their test results were too high.

<u>Jail Health Service Program</u> - Optional Program/Approved by the Illinois Department of Corrections

At the request of the Public Safety Committee of the Vermilion County Board, the Vermilion County Health Department researched and planned the development of a jail health nursing program as a component of a complete medical service program during the months of March through May, 1982.

The jail health service program was planned and developed with the complete cooperation and assistance of the Vermilion County Sheriff's Department and correctional staff of the Public Safety Building.

The Vermilion County Health Department actually started to deliver nursing services as a component of a well organized, scheduled and staffed jail health services program during June of 1982. The jail health services program is designed to provide basic health screening, physical assessment, medication administration and record maintenance services as required by the Illinois Department of Correction. The jail health services program was approved and recognized as in compliance with the Illinois Department of Correction Standards for Local Correctional Facilities during their annual inspections over the last eight years including 1989. Effective December 1, 1989 the staffing for this program was increased to twenty hours per week.

The Vermilion County Health Department provides scheduled nursing services including initial physical examinations, sick call, medication set-up and record maintenance at the Public Safety Building for four hours Monday through Friday each week.

In addition to the nursing services listed, the Vermilion County Sheriff's Department has a contractual agreement with a local physician to provide supervisory, consultative and medical services to the Public Safety Building inmates.

Maternal Health and Family Planning - Required Program/Approved

The primary objective of this program is to assure women of childbearing age the optimum chance for wanted pregnancies and the successful outcome of pregnancies and adequate preparation for the motherhood role. Currently, medical examinations, pregnancy testing, contraceptive supplies and educational services are offered to all citizens on the basis of voluntary participation.

Our family planning services are subsidized by several combined grant sources including an Infant Mortality Reduction Initiative (9 By '90) grant to provide additional staff. Eligibility for subsidized services is determined on the basis of family income reported by family planning clients. The Vermilion County Health Department has a discounted fee schedule based on our costs for providing specific services and supplies. Clients are required to pay a share of the costs of providing the services and/or supplies they receive for each visit. The grant funds subsidize these services by providing a fee-for-service reimbursement provision of services to eligible clients scaled on the individual or family income criteria as related to the federal poverty guidelines.

Parents Too Soon - Community Health Education

A new dimension was added to our family planning program in August of 1983. The Vermilion County Health Department received approval for a Parents Too Soon grant to provide the funds necessary to employ a full time health educator associate.

The primary goal of our PTS community health education program is to prevent adolescent health problems including pregnancies and sexually transmitted diseases. Adolescent health education presentations are conducted for a wide range of topics including drug and alcohol abuse, smokeless tobacco and steroid use risks as well as human sexuality and family living.

This program was initiated in 1983 and it has grown larger each year. Presentations are conducted in schools, churches, social service agencies, community organizations and medical facilities.

Male Responsibility Program - Health Awareness Responsibility Program

A new dimension was added to our health education program in July of 1989. The HARP program deals with male adolescents ages 8 - 15 located throughout the city of Danville. After-school programs have been developed at the Center for Children's Services, Daniel Elementary School and the Christian Home for Youth. Health issues are presented each week along with tutorial services (done by peer tutors). The students participating in the program are awarded for participating with computer time, field trips, meals, T-shirts, and awards presented at the end of the school year.

Outreach Counseling Project

In May of 1986 the Vermilion County Health Department utilized funds provided through the Infant Mortality Reduction Initiative (9 by '90) Community Network Services grant to employ a social worker to initiate this project. We now utilize a public health nurse to provide early intervention activities through outreach counseling.

The priority target groups for the project are adolescents in Vermilion County schools, minority groups and high risk pregnant women not in school.

Prenatal Care Project

The Vermilion County Health Department was initially able to develop and implement a prenatal clinic as part of a Maternal and Child Health Improvement Project funded by a combined federal Preventive Health Services and Maternal and Child Health block grant funds. The prenatal services were targeted towards pregnant, low-income women and their infants up to one year of age.

The primary objectives of the prenatal clinic project are to improve pregnancy outcome, reduce infant mortality and improve parenting skills by offering a comprehensive range of prenatal, maternal, postpartum, pediatric, clinical and educational services with <u>special emphasis</u> placed on preparing pregnant adolescents for all aspects of motherhood through intensive educational activities and periodic postpartum follow-up assessment visits to their own homes.

During 1986 we utilized funds provided through our Infant Mortality Reduction Initiative (9 x '90) Community Network Services grant to expand services in this clinical service area. The 9 x '90 grant provides funds to pay for additional laboratory services and additional obstetrical deliveries. We were also able to implement classes for the Creasy method of pre-term labor determination in 1986. During 1987 we were able to initiate Lamaze natural childbirth classes (see FWF/9x'90 Service Statistics for details).

Families with a Future/Infant Mortality Reduction Initiative

The Families with a Future program is the name adopted in 1987 for the Infant Mortality Reduction Initiative, locally referred to as "9 By "90".

The program is designed to achieve a goal of 9.0 deaths for every 1,000 live births in Illinois by the year 1990. This objective is the same as the United States Surgeon General's objective. The target population is pregnant women and women with infants up to one year of age residing in Vermilion County. Prevention of teenage pregnancies or any unwanted pregnancy is, also, a major focus of the program. The Vermilion County Health Department is the Lead Agency. The Lead Agency is responsible for networking, coordination and case management that will develop a comprehensive approach to the delivery of services to the high risk population in the Vermilion County Area.

The Families with a Future network for Vermilion County currently includes the following funded agencies:

<u>Catholic Social Services</u>: Counseling, maternity home placement, support and education for women of all ages, with special emphasis on women over 20.

<u>Center for Children's Services</u>: Work with women 20 years of age and under. Provide support groups, prenatal education, infant care education and counseling.

<u>Hoopeston Multi-Agency</u>: Outreach and transportation of clients in the northern area of Vermilion County for FWF services.

<u>Laura Lee Fellowship House</u>: Prevention program for teens called PACT (Peer Advocacy Counseling by Teens). Five neighborhood areas emphasize prevention and sex education.

<u>Planned Parenthood of Champaign</u>: Hoopeston Site. Provide family planning services to residents of northern Vermilion County.

<u>Champaign Children's Home and Aid Society</u>: Starting May, 1988, day care provided to qualified FWF infants in licensed day care homes under the supervision of this agency.

Vermilion County Health Department:

Family Planning: funds were provided to enable an additional 1,000 new clients to be served.

Prenatal: funds were provided to pay for obstetrical deliveries to women not eligible for Illinois Public Aid or who do not have insurance.

Outreach Counseling: a registered nurse provides pregnancy tests and visits all county high schools for assistance to pregnant teenagers. Transportation: transportation to services that will promote the FWF goals is given via Red Top Cab Company, American Red Cross, Catholic Social Services, Ace Taxi, Faith Taxi, and the Center for Children's Services.

Home Visitation: two (2) nurses visit FWF prenatal clients and infants to identify medical and social needs. Referrals and case management are based on these visits.

Women, Infants and Children (WIC) - Optional Program/Approved

The WIC program provides high nutrient supplemental foods for pregnant or breastfeeding women, infants and children up to five years of age. Eligibility for the WIC program is determined by income and medical or nutritional risk as outlined by the program risk criteria. The assigned caseload proportionately increased to 2,216 clients in a 4% monthly growth increments during the 1989 grant year. Program policies currently require that all women participants and mothers of infants or child participants attend at least one nutrition education class during each six month certification period.

In order to ease the hardships of transportation for the client, the WIC program offers certification assessment and counseling at three locations within Vermilion County:

- Satellite Office Danville Township Building, 101 W. North Street, Danville, Illinois.
- 2. Georgetown, Illinois
- 3. Hoopeston, Illinois
 - Seasonal Hoopeston (Migrants)

The statewide computer conversion of the WIC program scheduled for 2/13/90 in Vermilion County made it necessary for us to move the WIC program in its entirety to the satellite office location in order to provide effective delivery. The move occurred on October 1, 1989. Outreach has been crucial in the effective delivery of program services.

During July and August of 1989 our STD program staff had to control an outbreak of Penicillinase Producing Neisseria Gonorrhea (PPNG). Twelve persons were ultimately identified as positive for PPNG. As a direct result of 40 field investigations to track down sexual contacts, a total of 30 different persons were screened and the 12 persons identified as positive for PPNG were treated with appropriate (non-penicillin) antibiotics.

Communicable Disease Control and Immunization Program - Required Program/Approved

The goal of this program is to control communicable disease preventable by immunization and other available public health techniques. The Vermilion County Health Department's immunization program consists of regularly scheduled clinics designed primarily to provide required childhood immunizations on a large scale to preschool and school age children in Vermilion County.

The Vermilion County Health Department provides immunizations during 24 clinics scheduled throughout the calendar year at the Health Department offices. A copy of the annual immunization clinic schedule is available upon request.

A donation of \$1.00 per immunization is requested to cover local costs for administering the immunization. However, persons who report that they are unable to give a donation are still eligible to receive the required immunization.

Effective December 1, 1988, TB chest x-rays authorized by our personnel were performed outside our clinic by an approved medical facility under a contractual services agreement because we removed our x-ray machine.

AIDS/HIV

In January of 1986 the Vermilion County Health Department initiated an alternative test site program to provide anonymous HIV screening and counseling for persons identified at high risk for potential exposure to Human Immunodeficiency Virus: the causative agent for Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS).

Effective July 1, 1987, the Vermilion County Health Department was awarded an AIDS prevention grant by the Illinois Department of Public Health. This grant currently enables us to intensify our AIDS prevention activities by providing the funds necessary to designate a 50% full time equivalent AIDS Activity Liaison/Staff Nurse. The new AIDS Activity Liaison has the primary responsibility for performing HIV counseling and testing, as well as community education presentations.

Through 1989, nine (9) cases of AIDS have been reported and attributed to Vermilion County residents. One case which was earlier attributed to Vermilion County during 1988 was deleted and attributed to another Illinois county.

Environmental Health Division

Environmental health is one of the major components of public health. The environmental health program deals with all of the factors in man's physical environment which may have a detrimental effect upon him. The primary goal of the Vermilion County Health Department's environmental health program is to protect and improve the quality of life for the residents of Vermilion County.

The Illinois Department of Public Health <u>Standards for Local Health Departments in Illinois</u> requires five basic environmental health programs. These programs are:

- 1. Food Sanitation
- 2. Potable Water Supplies
- 3. Private Sewage Disposal
- 4. Solid Waste
- Nuisance Control

The Vermilion County Health Department provides approved programs in all five program areas. The environmental health division provides two other recommended programs: vector prevention/pest control and housing.

Food Sanitation - Required program/approved

The primary objective of the food sanitation program is the protection of the consumer by assuring that food and food products provided by food service establishments and retail food stores are protected against contamination by infectious agents or adulteration by toxic material.

The Vermilion County Health Department's <u>Ordinance Governing Food Service Sanitation</u> requires the environmental health staff to issue permits to operate and carry out inspections of food service establishments, retail food stores and temporary food service establishments. This ordinance currently covers all areas of Vermilion County except the area within the corporate limits of the city of Danville.

Potable Water Supplies - Required Program/Approved

The object of this program is to eliminate disease transmission and chemical poisons or adulterants through the provision of a safe, potable and adequate supply of water for drinking, culinary and sanitary purposes for every individual in Vermilion County.

In September, 1989, the Vermilion County Board enacted an <u>Ordinance Governing Potable Water Wells and Water Supplies</u> in Vermilion County. The Vermilion County Health Department began enforcing this ordinance on November 1, 1989. The ordinance and an agreement with the Illinois Department of Public Health empowers the Vermilion County Health Department to issue permits for the installation of all new water wells, inspect the installation of the wells and pumps to ensure they meet code requirements, inspect and collect water samples from non-community water supplies and ensure that all abandoned wells are properly sealed.

The environmental health staff also collects samples and inspects private water supplies on request of Vermilion County residents. The water samples are sent to the Illinois Department of Public Health laboratory in Springfield, Illinois for analysis. The sanitarian interprets the analysis of the water sample and reports the condition of the water in the sample to the owner of the water supply. If the water in the sample is found to be unacceptable for human consumption, the sanitarian will recommend appropriate corrective action. Of all the private water supply samples collected in Vermilion County in 1989, 35% were found to be unacceptable for human consumption.

Private Sewage Disposal - Required program/approved

The objective of this program is to prevent the transmission of disease organisms from the improperly or inadequately treated sewage by providing that all sewage is discharged to a properly designed, constructed and operated sewage disposal system. This objective is being achieved by enforcing the Vermilion County Health Department's <u>Ordinance Governing Private Sewage Disposal</u>. The ordinance authorized the environmental health staff to order corrections on inadequately treated sewage discharges, design and size private sewage disposal systems, inspect systems prior to being back filled to ensure they are constructed properly and issue licenses to all private sewage disposal contractors and septic tank pumpers.

Housing Program - Recommended Program

The goal of this program is to eliminate safety hazards and transmission of disease through the control of abandoned and structurally damaged buildings. The Vermilion County Health Department does not have a housing ordinance at this time, but the environmental health staff enforces sections of the <u>Vermilion County Ordinance</u> <u>Governing Solid Waste Disposal</u> that deals with fire damaged or abandoned structures. The environmental health staff also conducts home loan inspections on request from mortgage companies, state and federal agencies, realtors and individuals buying or selling a home. The loan inspections are conducted on properties that are in the process of changing ownership and consists of an inspection of the water supply and sewage disposal system that services the property. The sanitarian conducting the inspection determines if the water supply is safe and if the sewage disposal system is adequate and functioning properly.
